



Giving Directions



Across means on the other side. "I live at no 1, London Road. Across from me (on the other side of the road) is no 2, London Road."

"Go across the road." (=cross the road)

Walk **along** the river. (follow the river)

Walk **by** the river. (walk near the river)

Walk **beside** the river. (walk next to the river)

Go **up** the stairs.

Go **down** the stairs.

(You can also walk up or down a road or street.)

Go **through** the tunnel. (You **go in** one side, then you **come out** on the other side.)

Go **straight on** (at a crossroads or a roundabout).

Go **round** the corner.


Walk **around** a town. (Walk in a circle, or in a random pattern.)

Go **past** something – walk past something so that it then is behind you.

Go **over** something – go over / cross the railway line.


