

Across means on the other side. "I live at no 1, London Road. Across from me (on the other side of the road) is no 2, London Road.

"Go across the road." (=cross the road)

Walk along the river. (follow the river)

Walk by the river. (walk near the river)

Walk beside the river. (walk next to the river)

Go up the stairs.

Go down the stairs.

(You can also walk up or down a road or street.)

Go through the tunnel. (You go in one side, then you come out on the other side.)


Go straight on (at a crossroads or a roundabout).


Go round the corner.

Walk around a town. (Walk in a circle, or in a random pattern.) Go past something - walk past something so that it then is behind you.

Go over something - go over / cross the railway line.


